Erwin Chemerinsky

Alston & Bird Professor of Law and Professor of Political Science, Duke University School of Law

Erwin Chemerinsky, a nationally renowned professor of constitutional law and federal civil procedure at Duke University, was named founding dean of the Donald Bren School of Law at the University of California, Irvine, effective July 1, 2008. Chemerinsky is the author of four books: *Federal Jurisdiction* (2007), *Constitutional Law: Principles and Policies* (2006), *Constitutional Law* (2005), and *Interpreting the Constitution* (1987). He is the author of more than 100 articles that have appeared in journals such as the *Harvard Law Review*, *Michigan Law Review*, *Northwestern Law Review*, *University of Pennsylvania Law Review*, *Stanford Law Review* and *Yale Law Journal*. In 2005, he was named by *Legal Affairs* as one of the “top 20 legal thinkers in America.” He frequently argues appellate cases, including in the U.S. Supreme Court and the U.S. Courts of Appeals, and has testified frequently before congressional and state legislative committees. He received his B.A. from Northwestern University and J.D. from Harvard Law School.



On Dec. 4, 2006, students from across the country lined the main entrance of the U.S. Supreme Court to protest during arguments of two landmark school desegregation cases. In 2007, the Court ruled that voluntary integration plans of public schools in Seattle and Louisville were unconstitutional.

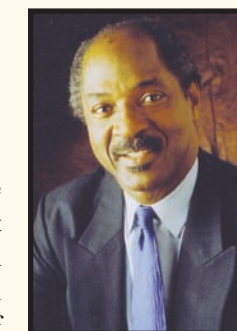
Keynote Speaker

Charles Ogletree

Jesse Climenko Professor of Law, Harvard Law School

Charles Ogletree is a prominent legal theorist who has made an international reputation by taking a hard look at complex issues of law and by working to secure the rights guaranteed by the Constitution for everyone equally under the law. In addition to his appointment as Jesse Climenko Professor of Law, Ogletree is the Founding Executive Director of Harvard Law School's new Charles Hamilton Houston Institute for Race & Justice, named in honor of the visionary lawyer who spearheaded the litigation in *Brown v. Board of Education*. The Institute opened in September 2005, and focuses on a variety of issues relating to race and justice, and will sponsor research, hold conferences, and provide policy analysis. In addition to numerous influential books and law review articles, Ogletree's commentaries on a broad range of timely and important issues have appeared in the editorial pages of the *New York Times*, the *Los Angeles Times*, and the *Boston Globe*, among other national newspapers. Ogletree earned a M.A. and a B.A. from Stanford University and a J.D. from Harvard Law School.



As a result of the Supreme Court's 2007 ruling, public schools that used racial criteria to reduce segregation must now find alternative plans.

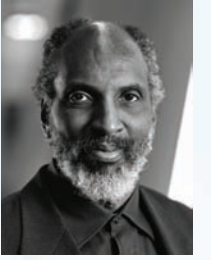

Dear Colleagues and Social Justice Partners,

Concluding its 2006-2007 term with a historic ruling on race in public policy, the Supreme Court, by a 5-4 vote, struck down voluntary integration plans in the public schools of Seattle, Washington and Louisville, Kentucky. Although a majority of the Justices ruled in favor of the elimination of race-conscious student assignment policies in elementary and secondary schools except as a last resort, five Justices found that there exists a compelling government interest in addressing the serious harm of racial isolation in our classrooms and communities. The Court's decision has sparked a national conversation over the meaning of the Fourteenth Amendment, the relationship between race and opportunity, and how we can achieve racial integration and fulfill the promise of *Brown v. Board of Education*.



This Symposium presents an important opportunity for legal scholars, social scientists, and education experts to collectively explore the potential impact of this decision on the pursuit of racial equality in public schools and beyond. Fresh ideas are needed not only to creatively capitalize on the opportunity presented by this decision, but also to minimize the potentially detrimental impact of this ruling on our collective efforts to bring about a society that is fair and just for all people. Papers generated from the Symposium will be published in the *Ohio State Law Journal* in the fall of 2008.

I encourage scholars, researchers, practitioners, and activists to participate in this important convening. Strategically addressing the opportunities and the challenges presented by the Supreme Court decision requires interdisciplinary thinking and collective wisdom.
