

DECLARATION OF CYNTHIA ROBINSON

My name is Cynthia Robinson and I am over the age of 18 and fully competent to make this declaration. Under penalty of perjury, I declare the following:

1. I am a registered Georgia voter and resident in Fulton County.
2. I am a United States citizen and am 60 years old. I have not been declared mentally incompetent by a judge, and I am not currently serving a sentence for a felony conviction.
3. I vote every chance I get. I try to cast a ballot in every federal, state, and local election. Usually I vote in person because I like going to my polling place to do my part, but this year, I'm planning to vote absentee.
4. I'm taking a lot of precautions because of the pandemic. I am a 13-year breast cancer survivor and I also have Sarcoidosis of the lungs, which is a chronic illness that impacts my respiratory and immune systems. My husband takes chemotherapy medication to treat his chronic leukemia, which makes him immunocompromised, so we're both at high risk for complications from COVID-19. To prevent ourselves from being exposed, we only go out for exercise or to buy necessities. When we do go out, we wear masks and practice social distancing. I have also been working from home. Even when some of the official restrictions are relaxed, my family and I will probably continue with social distancing precautions to protect ourselves since we're "high risk."
5. This year was the first time I realized I could vote absentee without actually being out of town. I plan to vote absentee this year because I think it's necessary for my health and my husband's health. Since I'm a cancer survivor and have a chronic illness, I am doing everything I can to avoid exposing myself to anything unnecessarily. Going to a crowded polling place would put me at risk.
6. I might continue voting absentee in the future as well because it's been difficult to get to the polling place in the past. I work full time, so my schedule, combined with Atlanta traffic, can make taking a trip to the polls a burden.
7. Although postage for an absentee ballot wouldn't be a financial burden for me, I don't own a postage scale to

weigh my ballot and determine how many stamps it
actually needs.
